Those Who Walk Alone

He was sitting on the bench just outside the Fellowship Hall with a computer on his lap. Two other I-Help guests were standing in front of him. I sat down on the bench to listen. The subjects were abnormal in my realm. Bus passes, job interviews, Memorial Day shelter and affordable places to live. One of the gentlemen was going to start a new job at a car wash. He was excited about





working but he wasn't sure of how he was going to get there. Not having a car made a simple problem complicated. We exchanged ideas on where to find bus passes. As I sat there my mind wandered back to my Saturday mornings in 1965 when at the age of 15 I hitch-hiked from the suburbs to downtown St.Paul to work at a car wash. Back then everyone was hired by the day. You would sit on a bench, and hoped your name was called. It was hard work. I know things have changed, but washing cars is tough especially if you are 40+ years old. Then the conversation changed to where they were going to spend Memorial Day. At first, I didn't get it, but as I listened I discovered that the libraries were going to be closed for the holiday and it's the library where a homeless person finds refuge from the heat. The young man with the computer said that he interviewed for a job. He was optimistic. I asked what he did and he said, "I.T. work." The employer told him

that everything looked good, but he would have to pass the background check. I saw anxiety on this intense young man's face. I assumed that this computer expert has a past, and a background check could be problematic. The Azcend bus arrived and I said farewell to my new friends wondering if I would see them again. It was then that I

wondering if I would see them again. It was then that I realized that I've never suffered homelessness. I've never walked their walk. I was always connected. When I was younger my parents were there to support me and when I was older I was blessed with a spouse who always listened. And too, I always had a community, people who loved me and cared for me. Being connected means you don't have to walk alone. It made me think about what Jesus wanted for his followers. It made me think that I-Help & programs like it, are exactly what Jesus had in mind when he said to love your neighbor as yourself.
